Catherine Hufana grew up in Stockton, California. Filipino culture runs deep in her family, and she has always felt "Filipino." Nevertheless, after visiting the Philippines in 1992, Catherine realized that she identified much more strongly with Americans than with native Filipinos.

As an American, Catherine's upbringing was very different from that of her parents. She was raised in a household that spoke mostly English, although both her parents are bilingual. Her father immigrated to Stockton from the Philippines in 1961 and joined the U.S. Navy. Catherine's mother was born in the U.S. and worked as a registered nurse, but she was raised very traditionally, enveloped in her Filipino heritage. As Catherine struggled to fit in with her American peers, her parents continued to introduce her to their own Filipino culture.

As a child, Catherine felt forced into the Church. She was expected to attend church services on a weekly basis, yet she had only a passing understanding of the religious tenets of Catholicism. However, as she grew older, Catherine began to appreciate religion and her Church. It has given her strength to endure life's challenges and difficulties. She has also learned to appreciate the valuable principles of the Church and deeply feels the importance of having faith.

Catherine's parents stressed getting an education from a very early age and she took that to heart. She attended public school, from elementary through high school, in Stockton. Catherine graduated from San Joaquin Delta College, San Jose State University, and University of San Francisco. She has also attended University of California at Santa Barbara and San Francisco City

College. Education allowed Catherine to follow her mother's footsteps into the nursing field.

In obtaining a strong education, Catherine has opened the doors of opportunity to live a more comfortable life. As her parents hoped, she can choose to avoid the struggle of raising a family on a tight budget.

Catherine's favorite childhood memory is of spending time with her extended family the Christmas before her grandfather passed away. All her relatives frequently would gather together as one, big family to celebrate various holidays. On this occasion, her grandfather was able to spend one last Christmas holiday with his entire family. Thinking back to the gathering of several generations on that particular time brings Catherine warm, happy thoughts.

The concept of family has influenced Catherine so strongly that she recognized her transition to adulthood through extending her own family.
